Half Term 1 – The Nature of God	 To understand the doctrine of the Trinity and how it is reflected in the Bible and worship. To understand the nature of the Trinity and the characteristics of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. To describe how the Trinity is reflected in Catholic worship, with particular focus on the sacraments. To analyse the Biblical sources of the belief in the Trinity – The Baptism of Jesus, Genesis account and John 1. To explain the formation of the doctrine of the Trinity through the events at the Council of Nicaea and the Council of Constantinople. To reflect on the teachings found in the Nicene Creed and their impact on the individual and Catholic community. To evaluate whether the Council of Nicaea and Council of Constantinople are still important for Catholics today. 	 Keyword test. Homework - 12 question quiz and exam questions. Multiple choice topic review – online. Formal Assessment – Does the Council of Nicaea and Council of Constantinople still have importance for Catholics today?
Half Term 2 – Creation and Humanity	 To understand the nature of God as reflected in the Genesis account of creation and the divergent Christian interpretations of creation. To reflect on the events in Genesis 1, 2 and 3 and describe what they teach about the nature of God. To describe how divergent Christians, interpret the Genesis account of creation, such as Catholics, Fundamentalists and Liberal Christians. To analyse the Catholic belief that humans are made in the image of God and its implication on the nature of human beings. To explain the Christian role of dominion over creation and their responsibility as stewards of the earth, with a focus on Pope Francis' encyclical, Laudato Si. 	 Keyword test. Homework - 12 question quiz and exam questions. Multiple choice topic review – online. Formal Assessment – Do all Christians believe the world was made in exactly seven days?
Half Term 3 – The Nature of Salvation and Grace	 To understand the nature of the Incarnation and its impact on human salvation through the grace of God. To evaluate the nature of Jesus as both human and Divine, through Biblical events and prophecies. (Birth of Jesus, death and Resurrection, miracles, messianic prophecies – Zachariah) To analyse the importance of each key feature of the Paschal Mystery – passion, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus. To explore the Biblical teaching on the nature of salvation and grace. To describe how God's grace is received in the Church through the sacraments and the impact on our salvation. To understand divergent Christian teachings on eschatology (life after death), focusing on particular and general judgement, heaven, hell and purgatory. To understand the aims and purpose of a Catholic funeral, for both the deceased and community. 	 Keyword test. Homework - 12 question quiz and exam questions. Multiple choice topic review – online. Formal Assessment – Is the Resurrection the most important moment in the life of Jesus?
Half Term 4 – Acts of Worship	 To understand the importance of practices within the Catholic Church and their impact on individual faith and community. To understand the meaning and effects of the seven Catholic sacraments and evaluate their importance. To describe the nature and significance of the Mass and explain the key events and their importance. To explore different types of prayer used within the Catholic Church and evaluate their effects. To explain the nature of popular piety and describe the use and importance of the Rosary, Stations of the Cross and Eucharistic Adoration. To evaluate the most effective form of worship – attending Mass, private prayer or going on a pilgrimage. 	 Keyword test. Homework - 12 question quiz and exam questions. Topic review – Exam questions. Formal Assessment – Is baptism the most important sacrament?

To describe the life and work of St. Peter and Paul as the first evangelists. To analyse how evangelisation is put into practice individually, locally, nationally and globally. To study the nature and history of the Catholic Church in Britain. 	
Half Term 6 – Scripture and Authority	 To understand the source of Catholic teachings and the role of authority within the Church. To understand the development and structure of the Bible and how it is used and interpreted by different Christians. To describe the nature of apostolic succession and how it provides authority to the Magisterium and impacts the importance of their role. To explain the nature of apostolic tradition and provide examples. To describe the origins and significance of the Church as the Body of Christ, as found in St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians.
