Classics Club

Pupils have enojoyed the first term of Classics Club with Mrs Smith in room 13 on Wednesdays. They started their journey to the ancient worlds by learning about Ancient Greece. Starting with Homer and The Iliad, pupils learned about the Trojan Wars and the fascinating mythology surrounding the gods and goddesses. We then learned about the ancient Olympics and some of the famed Olympic heroes, such as Milo of Kroton, six time wrestling winner. We learned some Greek language and explored the geography of ancient Greece. We finished our journey to Ancient Greece with a 'Come Dine with Me', ancient Greek style where pupils were able to try typically Greek food and taste Greek recipes.

Having looked at the similarities between Greek and Roman gods, we spent our last session creating Saturnalia greetings card to mark the ancient Roman festival that typically happened between 17th-23rd December. This festival was an opportunity to give thanks to Saturn, Roman God of Agriculture. Many of the festive traditions we associate with Christmas, such as the giving of gifts, the decoration of homes and feasting have their origins in this ancient Roman holiday.

Thank you to Year 11 historians who have worked hard in preparation for their mock exams. 
The Polar Network

Have you ever stopped to think about why there are so many countries that use red, blue, and white? Why are vertical and horizontal stripes used? Or why flags of African countries use a lot of black?

The study of flags is called Vexillology and comes from the Latin word vexillum meaning "flag" and the Greek suffix "-logy" meaning "study". The word "flag" is derived from the old Saxon word "fflaken" which means to fly or to float in the air.

The historical origin of flags dates back to around 1000 BC, when the Egyptians used versions of flags - some were even made out of wood or metal.

When Mount Everest and the moon were conquered, and when new found lands were discovered, explorers would raise flags as signs of their being the first to tread these unchartered lands.



What does colour on a flag represent?

Yellow – A symbol of generosity **White** – A symbol of peace and honesty

Red – A symbol of hardiness, bravery, strength & valour


Blue – A symbol of vigilance, truth and loyalty, perseverance & justice


Green – A symbol of hope, joy and love and in many cultures have a sacred significance


Black – A symbol of determination, often reflecting the ethnic heritage of the people

Parking

Although the vast majority of parents park safely and considerately when dropping off or collecting their children, a small number are still using the zig-zag markings for that purpose.

The markings are a vital safety feature that helps to provide uninterrupted vision for pupils crossing the road to enter/exit the school site.

According to Highway Code Rule 243, you should not park near a school entrance — as well as anywhere that would prevent access for emergency services, at or near a bus stop, opposite or within 10 metres of a junction, over a dropped kerb, and in front of an entrance to a property. Fixed penalty notices and fines can be issued in the event of infringement of these rules.

We ask for everyone's support in helping to keep our children safe.
