

Geography

Year 7 Geography

At the beginning of Year 7, pupils started the year with an enquiry question which provided an opportunity for them to carry out fieldwork techniques around our school grounds. After recently studying 'extreme weather' it seemed fitting to conclude the year with another fieldwork opportunity; investigating whether our school had a microclimate. Students used a digital anemometer and took recordings of the weather at various sites around the school. They then spent time in class presenting and analysing the data to draw conclusions based on their investigation.

Here are some questions to ask your child to encourage discussion on microclimates

- How much did the wind speed and temperature vary around the school?
- What instrument(s) did you use to record the temperature and wind speed?
- What is the beaufort scale and how did you use it in your enquiry?
- Can you tell me what is meant by the urban heat island effect (UHI)?
- What factors affected the climate of the school?
- Do you think our weather is becoming more extreme?



Year 9 Geography

This term we have done an out of school fieldwork enquiry with Year 9 to investigate globalisation in Lytham as part of our 'The Almighty Dollar' topic.

We discussed the idea of globalisation and how, within Lytham, this might be identified by how many shops are part of a national or international brand. Using this idea, we decided on a hypothesis 'There will be more independent shops in Lytham than chain stores'.

On the day of the field work, we walked down to the main shopping area and conducted a land use survey to identify the types of shops from a list of categories which we will later consider to see how many of them are independent shops and how many are chain stores. We also did a pedestrian count to see which areas of Lytham are busiest and whether this is influenced by the types of shops in that location. It was interesting to see how busy Lytham is on a week day, when we would normally be in school!

In future lessons we will be presenting the data we collected using the most appropriate methods and using this data to draw conclusions that prove or disprove our hypothesis. Pupils enjoyed being out of school to collect their primary data and it really helps to develop the enquiry skills which are essential for geographers.

History

Pupils have enjoyed an academically challenging and rewarding term in the Saint Bede's History department.

Year 7 have been working as historians by grappling with the work of historian Peter Frankopan to explain the importance of learning a broad history curriculum that spans global history. They have produced some wonderful treasure troves showcasing the impact that Medieval Baghdad had on Europe. Mrs Smith would like to give a special mention to 7T who have risen to this challenge admirably producing some thoughtful reflections on the importance of looking at history through many lenses.



Year 8 have been building on their knowledge of our key thread, Britain and the Wider World by focusing on the impact of the British Empire. They have analysed the impact that Imperialism had on enabling Britain to be the Industrial powerhouse of the 18th and 19th Century, whilst evaluating the impact this had on the New World, India and the West Coast of Africa. They have been immersed in the work of historians Sathnam Sanghera and Professor Emma Griffin. Pupils have been preparing for their upcoming trip to the International Slavery Museum and the Museum of Liverpool by learning about the rich, diverse history of Mali and its emperor, Mansa Musa-King of Kings. This has helped them to understand the importance of learning about pre colonial African history. We look forward to our trips and know that they will help to enrich their understanding. We are so proud of the academic excellence Year 8 have shown.

Year 9 have worked hard to reach judgements on the complex causal factors behind the defeat of Nazi Germany in 1945. They have been building on their understanding of causation since Year 7, so it has been a pleasure to see how far they have progressed. They have analysed and evaluated various historian's arguments on the significance of key World War Two events on the eventual downfall of the Third Reich. It has been wonderful to see them evaluate significance from differing perspectives. Why might Stalin cite the German defeat at Stalingrad as the deciding factor? They have loved learning about the fascinating British acts of subterfuge, especially Operation Mincemeat which saw the British government planting a fake corpse off the coast of Spain and the legendary work carried out at Bletchley Park to crack the enigma code. We are thrilled that so many Year 9's have chosen to continue their study of history on to GCSE next year. And to those pupils who leave us here, well done and good luck.

Year 10 have embarked on their study of Elizabethan England with zeal. We have loved spending time focusing on the Age of Discovery with particular interest in Francis Drake's circumnavigation of the globe from 1577-1580. We were lucky to be able to take some pupils to visit London. They were given a tour of Shakespeare's Globe, a replica of the original Elizabethan theatre, the Tower of London, where they saw the sites of some famous public executions, including that of Queen Elizabeth's alleged favourite noblemen, the Earl of Essex. They later had a tour of Francis Drake's flagship, the Golden Hinde (originally named The Pelican) where they were immersed in the reality of crewing a ship laden with treasure and livestock for a 3-year journey. Mrs Smith would like to thank pupils on the trip for their exemplary behaviour. You really were a credit to the history department and school.

Mrs Smith and the history department would like to wish you all a restful and productive summer. Year 10, please upload your summer retrieval work to Firefly as soon as you have completed it. This will help to prepare you for Year 11. We are so proud of you all, well done.



English

Lancashire Book of The Year

Year 9 pupils have been busy reading a selection of new fiction for the Lancashire Book of the Year Award. Lancashire Book of the Year - the longest running young people's regional book award in the country.

The award remains one of the few book awards in which young people themselves are solely responsible for choosing both the shortlist and the overall winning book.

The award is voted for by Year 9 students in high schools around the county. Each school is given a collection of books, submitted by publishers as being the best books they had produced for the 12-14 age group. The young people then read and shortlist the books before choosing the overall winner.

Accompanied by Mrs Tankard, Izzy, Sadie, Amy and Alana joined other Lancashire pupils at UCLAN (University of Central Lancashire) on Friday, 7th July and met the shortlisted authors as well as hearing from a couple of US writers via a live feed. They all received a free anthology of Lancashire short stories as well as buying signed copies of the shortlisted novels.

They all had their own clear favourites. Sadie was enthralled by the magical elements of 'Dark and Shallow Lies'; 'Twin Crowns' captivated Izzy as it combined magic, romance and tension; Amy was gripped by 'Defy the Night' and Alana was taken aback by the unexpected ending of 'The King is Dead' (no spoilers!).

The interactive nature of the event was enjoyed by all the participants who valued the opportunity to question the authors and share their views on the novels.

After much deliberation, Cynthia Murphy's 'Win, Lose, Kill, Die', a thriller set in a school for high achieving students where the rivalry to become Head Girl leads to murders was announced as the winner.

Our articulate, perceptive and erudite pupils represented Saint Bede's superbly.

Excellence Academy

Throughout June, Miss Beswick arranged for a group of eleven Year 9 pupils to take part in Blackpool Sixth Form College's Blackpool Sixth's 'Excellence Academy' – a prestigious series of four after-school workshops designed to help pupils to develop crucial college-level study skills. The pupils worked with other highly able students from different local schools, exploring academically challenging material from a range of disciplines, including: medical science; ethics; biochemistry; history and politics.

The skills developed included research, analysis and debating. The programme concluded with our pupils taking part in Oxbridge-style debates on 'Whether the US was justified in dropping the atomic bomb on Hiroshima and Nagasaki' and 'Is reproductive technology a threat?' As well as skilfully fielding challenging questions from other participants, lecturers and students, our pupils presented their arguments with confidence and maturity. They were great ambassadors for Saint Bede's.



Parking

Although the vast majority of parents park safely and considerately when dropping off or collecting their children, a small number are still using the zig-zag markings for that purpose.

The markings are a vital safety feature that helps to provide uninterrupted vision for pupils crossing the road to enter/exit the school site.

According to Highway Code Rule 243, you should not park near a school entrance – as well as anywhere that would prevent access for emergency services, at or near a bus stop, opposite or within 10 metres of a junction, over a dropped kerb, and in front of an entrance to a property. Fixed penalty notices and fines can be issued in the event of infringement of these rules.
