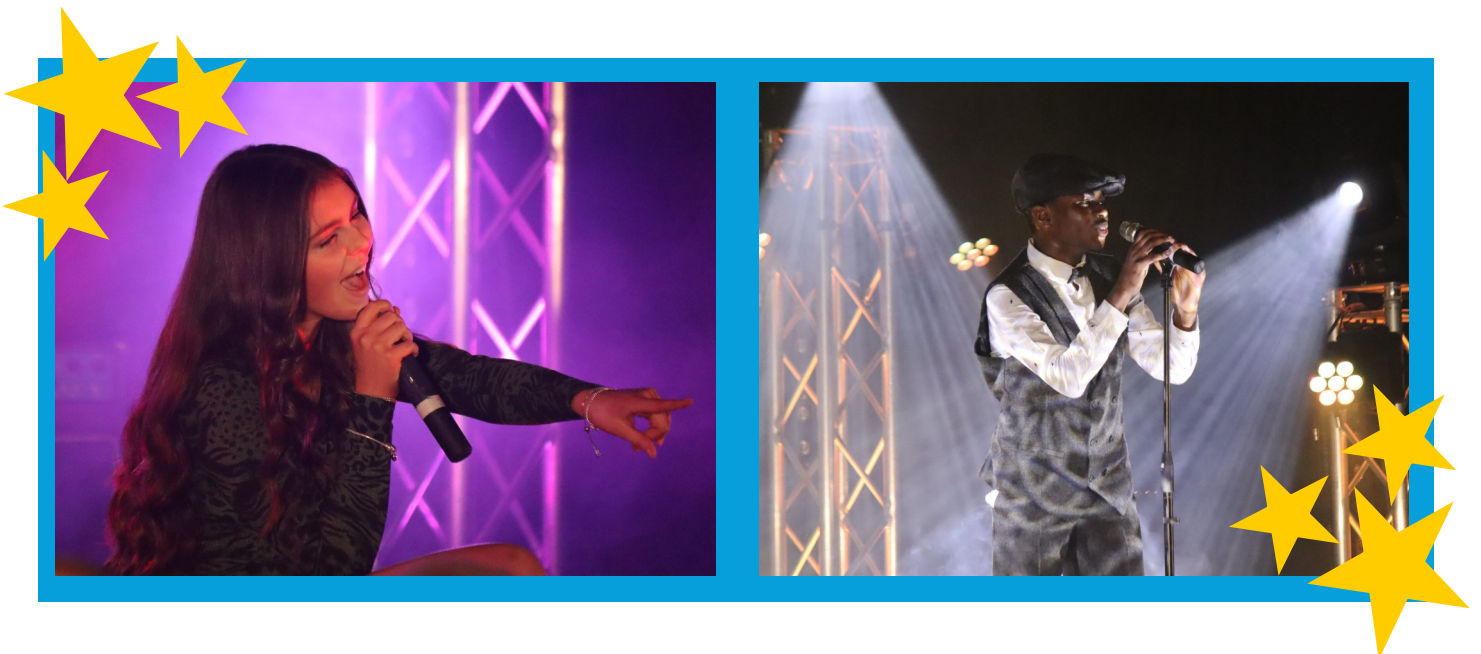
As well as the excitement and competitive element of 'Stars in their Eyes', it is always good to see the teamwork and spirit of mutual support and encouragement that characterises this event.

Another vintage year for this great galaxy of stars and we can be confident of an even brighter firmament in 2023!





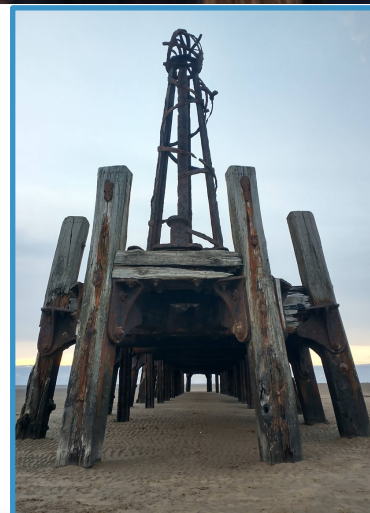
Geography Photography Competition

Last term, Saint Bede's geographers were encouraged to take part in the Geographical Association's annual photo competition. This year's theme was physical geography in process. Students were to capture physical geography in action and provide a short explanation of the physical processes taking place.

There were some outstanding entries this year, with both impressive images captured, alongside excellent geographical explanations. After submitting 10 shortlisted students, two Saint Bede's students have been recognised nationally and will feature in the GA magazine.

Number Day 2022

On Friday the 4th of February we had our first every Number Day, which enabled pupils to appreciate numbers in a different way to their usual Mathematics lessons, and raise money for the NSPCC.

There was a variety of different activities that pupils took part in, ranging from making shapes in their PE lessons, to finding the NSPCC buddy using various mathematical skills.

The Mathematics teachers also ran different games relating to probability at lunchtime. Pupils went head-to-head to see who could count closest to 30 seconds, tried rolling a matching dice to their teacher and completed Maths questions to enter a raffle.

UKMT Maths Challenge

There were several pupils in Years 9 and 10 who were selected to take on the UKMT Intermediate Mathematics Challenge this half term. The challenge is designed to encourage mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using various mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. They are expecting to get their results back soon, with bronze, silver and gold certificates on offer for those attaining the best scores, and even the possibility of making it into a follow-on round.

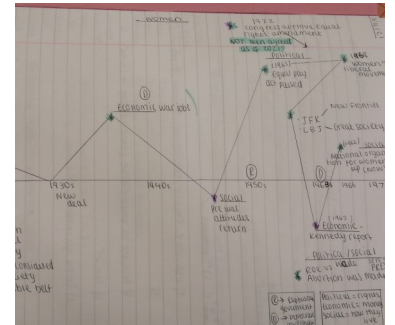

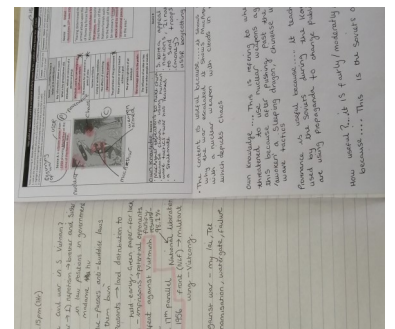

They will spend some of their time in workshops where they will develop their teamworking, critical thinking and leadership skills; all whilst exploring their relationships with God, themselves, and others. The rest of the time they will spend taking meals together, walking, chatting and most importantly challenging themselves to step out of their comfort zone and try new things (like climbing and archery).

We appreciate that this has been organised in a very short timescale, so we thank all the parents and pupils for their cooperation and support in bringing it together and for helping to create memories for your children that they will never forget.

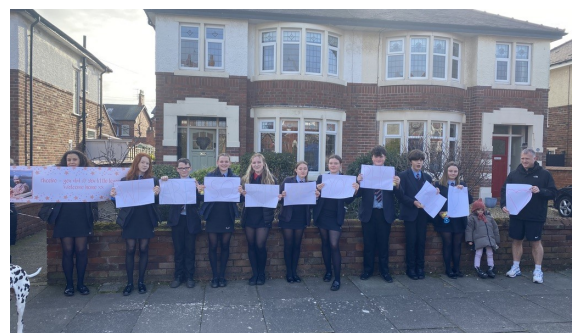


Ash Wednesday

Keeping Pupils Safe

It is disappointing that a small number of parents are still disregarding the regulations concerning the zig-zag markings outside the school entrances and placing pupils at risk by either stopping or parking on them. The markings are there to ensure that other road users have a clear view of the school entrance and that pupils crossing the road at those points have unobstructed vision and don't have to move between vehicles. The markings outside our main entrance are also on a blind bend.

Rule 243 of the Highway Code indicates a range of places where motorists must not park, including: on a bend, a dropped kerb or the brow of a hill. It also states that drivers must not park near a school entrance, anywhere that would prevent access for emergency services or near a bus stop, tram stop or taxi rank. Parking on yellow zig-zag lines at the times stated on the yellow signs can result in a fixed-penalty notice.

Please be mindful of this and help to keep our pupils safe.
