Whilst Black History is written through our history curriculum, Black History Month gives everyone the opportunity to share, celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture.


Historical hero of the half term



Who Was Rosa Parks?
 Rosa Parks was a civil rights leader whose refusal to give up her seat to a white passenger on a segregated bus led to the Montgomery Bus Boycott. Her bravery led to nationwide efforts to end racial segregation. Parks was awarded the Martin Luther King Jr. Award by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People the Presidential Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Gold Medal.



Arrest
 On December 1, 1955, Parks was arrested for refusing a bus driver's instructions to give up her seat to a white passenger. She later recalled that her refusal wasn't because she was physically tired, but that she was tired of giving in. After a long day's work at a Montgomery Department store, where she worked as a seamstress, Parks boarded the Cleveland Avenue bus for home. She took a seat in the front of several rows designated for "colored" passengers. The Montgomery City Code required that all public transportation be segregated and that bus drivers had the "duty" of a police officer of the city while in actual charge of any bus for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the code. While operating a bus, drivers were required to provide separate but equal accommodations for white and Black passengers by seating seats. This was accomplished with a line roughly in the middle of the bus separating white passengers in the front of the bus and African American passengers in the back. When an African American passenger boarded the bus, they had to get on at the front to pay their fare and then get off and re-board the bus at the back door.

Parking

Although the vast majority of parents park safely and considerately when dropping off or collecting their children, a small number are still using the zig-zag markings for that purpose.

The markings are a vital safety feature that helps to provide uninterrupted vision for pupils crossing the road to enter/exit the school site.

According to Highway Code Rule 243, you should not park near a school entrance — as well as anywhere that would prevent access for emergency services, at or near a bus stop, opposite or within 10 metres of a junction, over a dropped kerb, and in front of an entrance to a property. Fixed penalty notices and fines can be issued in the event of infringement of these rules.

We ask for everyone's support in helping to keep our children safe.

Pilgrimage to Jarrow Hall

On Friday, 8th and Friday, 15th October, all our pupils in Years 7 & 8 took part in a pilgrimage to Jarrow Hall to find out more about the Venerable Bede, our patron saint and learn what life was like in Anglo-Saxon Britain. This is very much a 'rite of passage' for pupils when they start their life at Saint Bede's and we were pleased to provide this opportunity for Year 8 who had missed out on this opportunity last year.

Our pupils were able to visit a museum to find out more about the monastic life experienced by Saint Bede as well as his contribution to documenting our history and translating parts of the Bible. They took part in a range of activities including calligraphy and stamping replicas of Anglo-Saxon coins as well as investigating artefacts from the time.

A visit to the replica Anglo-Saxon village and farm brought the past to life and gave a vivid sense of the challenges faced by our ancestors as well as their contribution to the world we live in today.
